




- What is a "good" school?

Applying to College

Look at data on students previously accepted


- Average and mid-range SAT/ACT scores
- Average GPA and GPA range
- UNC system data comparison

Think of college choices on a continuum: Safety- Target - Reach

- Safety Schools almost certainly be admitted
- Target Schools test scores, GPA are similar to those of the recent entering class
- Reach Schools meet criteria but may not have the stellar qualifications of most first-year students

Types of Applications



Regular Decision

Most applications are due between January 1 and February 1. Decisions are received in March.

Early Action

Applications are typically due October 15 or mid-November, and decisions are released December/January. Students are not required to commit to a particular university until May 1. Many colleges require you to submit your application during Early Action window to be considered for university scholarships.

Early Decision

Students apply Early Decision Only use if they are 100% sure they are attending this school regardless of financial aid at other schools. Early decision is a plan where you may submit, your application early to one college, usually by October 15 of your senior year. You are notified of your status by December 1. This is a BINDING AGREEMENT As part of an early decision plan, you are required to sign a statement agreeing to accept the college's offer of admission. You must also withdraw your application from other colleges if accepted under Early Decision. (Used by Duke, Elon, Wake Forest, etc.) Points to remember are the same as listed above in Early Action.

Rolling Admission

There are no application deadlines. Universities accept applications throughout the year. Decisions are made on a case-by-case basis Students usually receive a decision within 4 to 6 weeks.

Standardized Testing



- Achievement test with reading, writing & language and math
- 3 hours in length
- Scored on a scale of 400-1600
- Register at <u>www.collegeboard.org</u>



- Achievement test with math, critical reading, science, and optional writing section
- 2 hours 55 minutes without writing section
- 3 hours 40 minutes with writing section
- Scored on a scale of 1-36
- Register at <u>www.actstudent.org</u>

Test Optional, what does this mean?

Test optional for the Class of 2023

- Several colleges and universities have announced that they are going 'test optional'; meaning they will not require SAT and/or ACT test scores on student applications.
- More emphasis place on the applicants academic and extracurricular record.
- Academic criteria that will be reviewed include the student's grades in core academic courses, the rigor of a student's course selection as compared to what is offered in the school/community.
- UNC System universities will not require SAT and ACT test scores on students' applications for the spring, summer and fall 2023 sessions. The UNC System Board of Governors voted to extend test optional for the next admissions cycle because COVID-19 limited test-taking options for students.
- Universities state, "students should not feel any pressure to take standardized tests at this point. Scores submitted will only be used to enhance a student's application."

Community Colleges

- NC Community College System:
 - One of the largest systems of higher education in the nation with 58 comprehensive community colleges serving all 100 NC counties.
 - One within a 30-minute drive of all NC residents.
 - Lowest tuition in the Southeast Region one of the lowest in the nation!
 - You may apply to the community college of your choice, regardless of your county of residence
 - Offers' Associate Degrees and Certificate Programs
 - Offers college transfer programs to 4-year colleges such as UNC C-STEP and NC State's' C3.

An official document that reflects academic progress throughout high school


What's on it?

• If applying to a college or university via Common App, Ms. Sharpe will upload your transcript for you for free.

- If applying to an in-state college or university directly via their website, use CFNC.org to have your transcript sent electronically.

 - Click on "Apply To College"
 - Click on "Application Hub"
 - Select "Request a Transcript"





EARLY BIRD


Students who file the FAFSA during the first three months tend to receive double the grants, on average, of students who file the FAFSA later.

To file the FAFSA, the student and one of his/her parents are required to use an <u>FSA ID</u>, made up of a username and password.

- You can apply for an FSA ID at any time, you do not have to wait until October 1.
- If a parent has multiple children completing the FAFSA, the parent should use the same FSA ID for each child.
- Your FSA ID is used to sign legally binding documents electronically. It has the same legal status as a written signature.
- Don't give your FSA ID to anyone or allow anyone to create an FSA ID for you—not even your parent, your child, or someone helping you fill out the FAFSA® form. Sharing your FSA ID could put you at risk of identity theft!
- From the time you apply, it can take anywhere from **one to three days** to



Helpful tips

- Get student involved in the process.
- Double check entered SSNs.
- Begin searching for outside scholarships now!
- DO NOT PAY for scholarship searches!
- DO NOT PAY to complete the FAFSA!
- Private Colleges are not always more expensive.
- Explain unusual circumstances to the Financial Office.
- Meet earliest deadline of colleges in which you are interested.
- Provide all information requested.
 - Complete all questions accurately.
- Don't wait until you are admitted to file the FAFSA.
- Keep a copy of all documents for your records.



If your child plans to play collegiate sports

- Be sure your son/daughter has:
 - A current NCAA account
 - Has selected Crossroads FLEX High School as their current high school
 - Has shared their NCAA number with prospective colleges
 - Must send SAT scores directly from College Board; use code 9999
 - Everyone expecting to play sports at the college level must register

Cum Laude

Students with a 3.75 - 3.99 weighted GPA

Magna Cum Laude

Students with a 4.0 - 4.249 weighted GPA

Summa Cum Laude

Students with a 4.25 or higher weighted GPA


Students will receive their stole for graduation with this distinction at graduation rehearsal as well as a notation on the graduation program.


Students must:

Senior Quotes

Later in the year, your students will be asked to submit their desired quote for the yearbook. Many students use well-known quotes of people they admire, but they are also welcome to create their own, unique sayings. All quotes should be school-appropriate and when applicable, have the proper attributions. You may want to consider talking to your Seniors about possible quotes they may want to consider to make sure the selected quotes are the best representations of the students.

Senior Dues

- All Seniors are required to pay a Senior Graduation Fee to help offset costs associated with graduation and other senior events during the year. These fees will apply to the diploma, graduation stage décor, graduation program, the senior reception & recognition certificates, and the senior picnic activities & décor.
- The fee will be \$40.00 for the 2022-2023 school year. Dues may be submitted using the Online School Payment portal. (OSP may charge a small upcharge of ≈4%). Seniors may also pay their dues on campus at the front desk.



As the parent/guardian what do I need to remember?

- Remember:
 - Celebrate that you are the proud parent of a senior in high school!
 - Encourage and support your child even more this year.
 - Know that they are nervous about their next step in life.
 - They are concerned with:
 - Whether or not they are "good enough" to get into a particular college
 - Moving away from home
 - Meeting new people and finding new friends
 - Responsibilitiesgetting up on their own, talking to professors, scheduling time to do their homework, getting along with a stranger (roommate), etc.
- Have your son or daughter schedule their Senior Interview with Ms. Sharpe and plan to attend if you can. If not, we can conference call you in to be a part of the process.
- College applications are a process; think marathon, not a sprint!



- Make sure your child is currently working on their college applications.
- If your child is considering attending college in North Carolina, be sure to complete the RDS process.
- Be sure your child has completed their Senior Brag Sheet
- Ask your child if s/he has scheduled their Senior Conference with Ms.
 Sharpe. Parents are invited to join.
 Conferences will be held both face-to-face and via Google Meet.
- Keep up with all scholarship offers to your child as Ms. Sharpe will request that information in the Spring to compile the total scholarship award for Crossroads FLEX Class of 2023!
- Be sure to pay Senior Dues (for graduation fees, senior events etc.)
